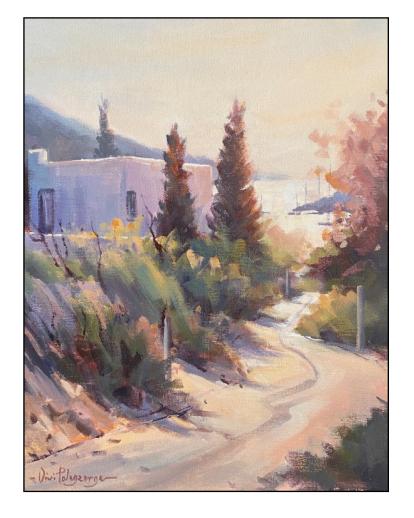

Review of Impressionist Painting with Palette Knife Workshop with Claire McCall

Nine participants had an enjoyable and informative day at Claire's workshop, where she demonstrated how to create bold, light-filled impressionist style paintings with a palette knife.

Claire began with a discussion and demonstration of palette knife techniques, including ways to load the knife and the importance of a fluid wrist action.

As for the paint, a limited colour palette was used, essentially being four colours and white, plus another three colours as highlights. From these almost any colour can be mixed and it makes it easier to mix more paint as required. The importance of tonal values to capture light in a painting was also demonstrated, with the three tones – dark, medium and light.

Palette knife painting is so different from painting with a brush, which we were all more used to. Participants could choose their own medium, so we had a mixture of traditional oil, water mixable oil and acrylic paint.

After the initial demonstration the fun began as we practiced different components, such as how to suggest clouds, sand, rocks and water and the importance of leaving spaces for the ground paint to show through.

After lunch we all began work on our own masterpieces. Claire demonstrated a beautiful beach scene, and as each participant developed their own version different styles and techniques emerged.

The workshop was great fun and very educational. I feel I learnt a lot more about using oil paints and how to create looser paintings with more simple compositions, but always with a strong focal point for interest.

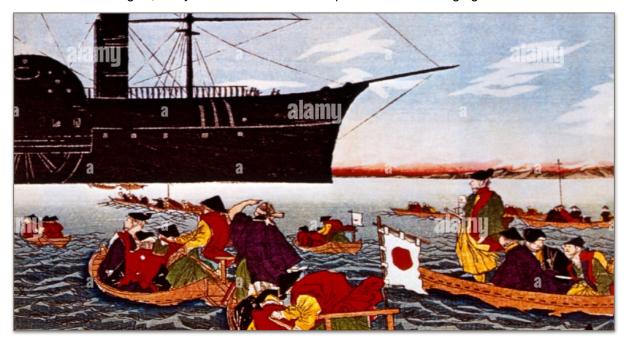
JAPONISME, UKIYO-E

Japan had for many centuries isolated itself from the Western world. However, Portuguese, Spanish, and Dutch traders were persistent and were able to engage in regular trade with Japan in the 16th and 17th centuries. The Europeans tried to convert the Japanese to Catholicism. However, this plus their tendency to engage in unfair trading practices led Japan to expel most foreigners in 1639.

On July 8, 1853, American Commodore Matthew Perry led four warships into Tokyo Bay, seeking to establish for the first time in over 200 years regular trade and discourse between Japan and the United States. Using a combination of threats and gifts, Perry was able to force the Japanese into a trading agreement with the USA.



The Perry Expedition led directly to the establishment of diplomatic relations between Japan and the western Great Powers, and eventually to the collapse of the ruling Tokugawa shogunate and the restoration of the Emperor. Following the expedition, Japan's burgeoning trade routes with the world led to the cultural trend of *Japanisme*, in which aspects of Japanese culture influenced art in Europe and America.

The West it seems was particularly taken with the freshness and spontaneity of Japanese art and design. While the effects of the trend were most pronounced in the visual arts, they extended to architecture, landscaping and gardening, and clothing.

Even the performing arts were affected; Gilbert and Sullivan's The Mikado is perhaps the best example.

Western European artists, particularly the French were especially entranced by ukiyo-e, Japanese woodblock prints, which became a source of inspiration for many. ^[5] These prints were created for the commercial market in Japan. Western artists were intrigued by the original use of colour and composition. Ukiyo-e prints featured dramatic foreshortening and asymmetrical compositions.

During this time, European artists were seeking alternatives to the strict European academic methodologies. Curiosity shops, tea warehouses, and larger shops began to stock Japanese prints. Artists like James Abbott McNeill Whistler, Édouard Manet,

and Edgar Degas derived inspiration from the Japanese woodblocks. Shops who imported Japanese art products organized gatherings which facilitated the spread of information regarding Japanese art and techniques.^[27]

The French called this fascination with Japanese art and design Japonisme ("Japanism").

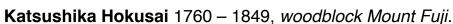
Ukiyo-e prints became a major influence on Western art. Western artists were inspired by the different uses of compositional space, flattening of planes, and abstract approaches to colour. An emphasis on diagonals, asymmetry, and negative space can be seen in the works of impressionist and post-impressionist Western artists who were influenced by this style.

Ukiyo-e, directly translating to "pictures of the floating world," embodies the concept of "ukiyo," a term originally rooted in Buddhist philosophy. Historically, "ukiyo" described the suffering of life, but over time, its connotation shifted to symbolize the transient, fleeting worlds of nature, human pleasures and desires. These Japanese prints of a "floating world" represented both the ephemeral natural world as well as

a hedonistic urban lifestyle, marked by entertainment, leisure, and passing beauty. In essence, ukiyo-e captures this evanescent world in vibrant **Visuals**.

Japanese art prints, particularly those featuring women such as courtesans and geishas, offered a complex and multifaceted portrayal of femininity. Beyond their undeniable aesthetic allure, these prints carried profound undertones that transcended mere visual representation. The delicate and ephemeral beauty of the female subjects, as captured in the intricate details and nuanced expressions, served as a poignant reminder of the transient nature of beauty, an aspect deeply ingrained in Japanese culture and aesthetics. Yet, there was an additional layer to these portrayals. The poised postures and serene faces also often masked a deeper commentary on the societal constraints and expectations placed upon women. The lavish kimonos, intricate hairstyles, and elaborate accessories, while beautiful, could also be seen as symbolic of the societal shackles that both celebrated and confined them. Ukiyo-e artists like Hokusai, Hiroshige, Utamaro and Shunsho deftly wove a narrative that simultaneously exalted the beauty and grace of these women while also shedding light on the challenges and limitations they faced within the societal framework.

Ukiyo-e artists whilst exploring "the floating world" also portrayed the natural world. One of the most renowned Ukiyo-e artists, Katsushika Hokusai, created "The Great Wave off Kanagawa," a masterpiece that epitomises the power and beauty of nature. Hokusai's meticulous attention to the interplay between line and colour, combined with his innovative compositions, made his works timeless.



Another influential figure, <u>Utagawa</u> <u>Hiroshige</u>, was known for flora and fauna and evocative landscapes that captured the essence of Japan's natural beauty. See below his "**Shoal of fishes**".

Édouard Manet, the father to the Impressionists, was the first major painter to create artworks in response to ukiyo-e prints. Keen to break with tradition and yet still represent the here and now of daily life in Paris, the prints he saw from Japan showed him how this could be achieved. They gave Manet permission to do away with perspective, to use flat colours instead of careful light and shade, yet still represent his subjects with all-important authenticity.

Manet's works, with their learned flatness of colour and static style, mark the start of artists considering their own takes on ukiyo-e art. Manet began to bring to life the 'floating world' of Paris – the bars, the cafes, and the people who frequented them – much as Japanese artists had captured the floating world of Edo (Tokyo) before him.

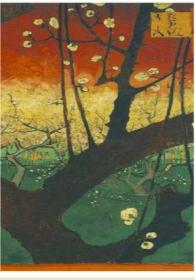
Notable Western artists who adored Japanese ukiyo-e to various degrees were Paul Gauguin, Vincent Van Gogh, Edgar Degas, Claude Monet, Toulouse-Lautrec, Pierre Auguste-Renoir, Camille Pissarro, Mary Cassatt....and many others.

Vincent Van Gogh was

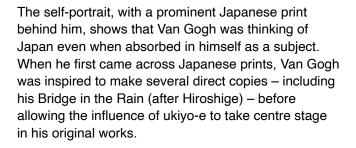
certainly not the first to fall under the spell of Japanese art, but he eventually embraced it so eagerly that he and his brother, Theo, amassed a collection of hundreds of ukiyo-e woodblocks – now held by the Van Gogh Museum(Amsterdam). See his Bridge in the Rain and Plumtree.

- 7. Artworks must be the entrant's own original work, executed without physical assistance from a tutor or any other person.
- 8. Only an entrant's own photography may be used as a reference for an artwork.
- 9. The artwork must not be copied from another artist's painting, drawing or photograph.

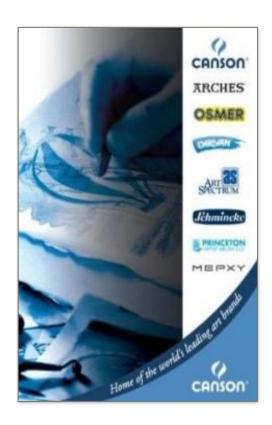
